What is a referendum?

On Tuesday, April 1, 2025 the School District of Crandon will ask district voters to consider a referendum question. A "Yes" vote will allow the District to Exceed the State of Wisconsin's revenue limit by \$1,250,000 for each of the next five years.

OPERATIONAL REFERENDUM

An operational referendum asks voters for permission to exceed the stated imposed revenue limit for the purpose of funding annual school operations. Costs associated for school operations include, but are not limited to: teacher and support staff salary and benefits, student technology software and devices, curriculum and student programming, utility and transportation costs and general maintenance and custodial expenses.

NON-RECURRING REFERENDUM

There are two different types of referendums that a school district can run, recurring and non-recurring. A recurring referendum means a school district will be able to levy that additional amount forever, without going back to the community for permission to exceed the revenue limit.

A non-recurring referendum, which the School District of Crandon is asking, means a school district can levy that additional amount for the period of time defined in the resolution. This option was chosen as it allows the voters in the School District of Crandon an opportunity to make informed choices in future years.

The School District of Crandon is asking for a five year operational, non-recurring referendum.

Referendum Question

Shall the School Board of the School District of Crandon be authorized to exceed the revenue limit under Section 121.91 of the Wisconsin Statutes by an amount of \$1,250,000 for the 2025-2026 school year and \$1,250,000 each year for the 2026-2027, 2027-2028, 2028-2029 and 2029-2030 school years on a non-recurring basis for the purpose of paying District operational costs as provided in the forgoing resolution?



If approved, how will taxes be impacted?

The chart below shows the impact of the referendum on a homeowner's taxes on an annual, monthly and daily basis. Amounts are shown based on home value of \$100,000, based on an estimated referendum mill rate increase of 24 cents per thousand dollars of property value.
